Mission: We provide a supportive environment for youth to explore and create their goals and aspirations while building upon their strengths.

Our support, treatment and parent training helps these families overcome the impact of poverty, community violence, mental health problems, addictive illness and patterns of child abuse and neglect that put their children at risk.

Mission: Access Institute provides high-quality psychological care to people of all ages who fall through the socioeconomic cracks while training the next generation of mental health professionals through a model that values human complexity, supports socially-conscious practice, and promotes sustained human growth.

Services: They offer low and no-fee psychological services (psychiatry, therapy, assessment, case management) to those who want and need psychological support, but aren't able to access it for any number of reasons including: income, cultural barriers, stigma around mental health, and lack of mobility. They also have an in school mental health program and an elder program.

Mission: The Al-Anon Family Groups are a fellowship of relatives and friends of alcoholics who share their experience, strength, and hope in order to solve their common problems. We believe alcoholism is a family illness and that changed attitudes can aid recovery.

Services: Al-Anon has but one purpose: to help families of alcoholics. We do this by practicing the Twelve Steps, by welcoming and giving comfort to families of alcoholics, and by giving understanding and encouragement to the alcoholic.

APA Family Support Services

Mission: to create healthy families by providing domestic violence and child abuse prevention services.

Services: Parent Support (Prevention) which includes outreach and engagement, parenting education, support groups, health education, kinship support, Early Literacy and Economic Self-Sufficiency Project. Home Visitation (Early Intervention) services are provided by bilingual and bicultural staff. The Family Support Center located in Chinatown provides programs and services to support the growth and development of all family members – adults, youth and children. Confidential Counseling is available to families or to individual family members. The API HOTLINE is a resource to parents and youth in times of stress and crisis.

Conditions treated include: Attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), School issues, Autism, Depression, Bipolar disorder, Worry or anxiety, Psychosis (hallucinations and delusions), Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), Eating disorders, Suicidality, cutting and other intentional self-injury, Obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), Tourette's disorder and other tic disorders, and family challenges.
